II. Course Description

The English program is committed to promoting and facilitating the development of critical and creative thinkers capable of communicating effectively to deal with the high expectations and demands of society which is immersed in a global interchange and collaboration the program will provide a comprehensive, challenging, and enriching curriculum that takes to account students' social, economic, cultural, and personal backgrounds including their knowledge and skills. In the pre-school and elementary grade levels the focus is the same, with special emphasis in the “Balanced Literary Approach” to develop auditory comprehension, oral and written communication, and cultural diversity. Creative writing is introduced at these levels and the encouragement to create bilingual resources begins here. Within the English Laboratory, the students will target the ability to communicate verbally in English, helping them feel more comfortable with the language.
