### I. Course Description

The History of World Civilizations course at the secondary level seeks to provide the student with a valuable learning experience in which he will critically analyze historical events, social, political and cultural processes that characterized each of the great societies that have promoted the world historical development, impacting humanity in the XXI century. This course seeks to promote an environment of in-depth study of world historical events and processes that go from the origin of the first civilizations to the 19th century.
